



DID YOU KNOW . . .



... it's easy to ruin the fuel pump inside your gas tank?

This came to my attention recently, and since several of our GWTWs are past fifty and might not be familiar with this gas tank/fuel pump arrangement, I thought I would pass it on to you.

If you run out of gas, don't continue to try to start the vehicle. The gas in the tank keeps the fuel pump cool, and even if the gas is very low, the fuel pump gets hot and is ruined. Replacing a fuel pump is expensive.

Follow the lessons below to protect your fuel pump: Lesson #1: Don't run out of gas. Lesson #2: If you do, don't run the starter more than once. Lesson #3: It's probably a good idea to keep the gas in the tank from getting too low, especially in hot weather.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Church Staff's Snack

- 2 cups toasted rice cereal
- (such as Rice Krispies)
- 2 cups peanut butter-flavored corn & oat cereal (such as Cap'n Crunch)
- 2 cups mini marshmallows
- 2 cups chopped pecans

1-1/2 lb. white chocolate, chopped

Coat large baking sheet with nonstick cooking spray.

In a large bowl, combine toasted rice cereal, peanut butter-flavored corn and oat cereal, marshmallows and pecans.

Place chopped chocolate in a medium-size bowl and microwave on HIGH for about 3 minutes, stirring halfway through. Stir until smooth. Pour melted chocolate over cereal mixture and stir until coated. Spread mixture onto prepared baking sheet. Refrigerate for at least 1 hour or until firm. Cut into 24 squares. **DELICIOUS!!!**

Handy Hint

If you need to make a relish tray, and a dinner plate just isn't big enough, try using the revolving glass tray in your microwave. It works like a charm!


