RECIPE OF THE MONTH

CREAM OF BROCCOLI SOUP

- 3 cans (14.5 oz.each) chicken or vegetable broth
- 9 cups (about 1-1/2 lbs) broccoli florets
- 1 small onion, coarsley chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
- 1-1/3 cups dry nonfat milk
- 1/2 cup water
- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/4 tsp salt

1/4 tsp ground black pepper

Boil broth in large saucepan. Add broccoli, onion and garlic. Bring to a boil, reduce heat to low. Cover, cook for 5 to 7 minutes or until broccoli is tender. Remove from heat, cool slightly.

Transfer half of vegetable broth mixture to a blender or food processor (in batches, if necessary), cover. Blend until desired consistency. Return to remaining mixture in saucepan.

Combine dry milk, water, flour, salt and black pepper in medium bowl, mix well. Stir into soup. Heat to serving temperature. Serve with croutons if desired.

(Note: I like to put a pinch of ground ginger in my bowl of soup.)

Samuel Clemmons' Childhood Home By Mary Anne Bertke





You know, some of the best tourist experiences are the ones that begin with little expectations. As a child, I was a big fan of Mark Twain, so I was all for seeing the childhood home of Samuel Clemmons. Bob could not have cared less; he just didn't want to go home.

The campground, correctly named Mark Twain Cave and Campground, was perfectly situated right at the cave and within a few miles of the town. There we purchased an Adventure Passport so we could do it all: Mark Twain's Boyhood Home and Museum, the Cave Tour, and the Mississippi Riverboat Cruise. It didn't take long to really get into the spirit of those gentler times and understand Hannibal's slogan, "America's Hometown."
