

HAWAIIAN TRIFLE

- pound cake or angel food cake
- box instant vanilla pudding
- 1 large and 1 small tub of Cool Whip
- 1 can crushed pineapple/well drained
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1 cup flaked coconut
- 4-6 bananas-sliced

In large mixing bowl, mix Cool Whip and all other ingredients EXCEPT cake and bananas. Do not over mix, just well enough to incorporate dry pudding mix. Slice cake into cubes and slice bananas. Layer cake on bottom of bowl. Spread layer of Cool Whip mixture over cake. Add a layer of bananas. Keep adding layers of cake, Cool Whip and bananas. Top off with the Cool Whip and pecans and/or coconut.
